David Banisar is a Policy Fellow at the Open Society Institute and Visiting Research Fellow at the Faculty of Law, University of Leeds. Previously he was a Research Fellow at the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University affiliated with the Harvard Information Infrastructure Project. He is currently researching and writing on global developments relating to access to information and privacy. He has worked in the field of information policy for over eleven years.

He is Deputy Director of Privacy International, a UK-based human rights group <<http://www.privacyinternational.org>> and was one of the founders and Policy Director of the Electronic Privacy Information Center. He is also a consultant to many NGOs, governments, and other organizations on information issues including freedom of information, privacy, data protection, internet security, electronic commerce, consumer protection and free speech.

He is the author of numerous books, studies, and articles on privacy, surveillance and data protection, including *The Electronic Privacy Papers* (John Wiley and Sons, 1997) and two major studies of international developments in information law: *Privacy and Human Rights: An International Study of Privacy Laws and Practices* (1998, 1999, 2000 editions) which review the privacy, data protection, surveillance and FOIA laws and practices in 55 countries and co-author of *Encryption and Liberty* (1999, 2000 editions), which review the encryption policies of 100 countries. He is currently a columnist for *SecurityFocus.com* and his columns regularly also appear at *BusinessWeek.com*.
